CCW updates

Registration Fees

Effective January 1, 2023, Early Learning Resource Centers will begin paying a registration fee to DHS certified child care providers for all CCW children at the time of their initial enrollment. Registration fees for newly enrolled children will automatically be added to the provider invoice for the service period in which the enrollment was effective. No further action will be required. Effective January 1, 2023, providers cannot charge CCW families registration fees or the difference between what the ELRC pays for a registration fee and what the provider charges private pay families for a registration fee. (\$75 for centers, \$50 for group/family providers).

Annual Registration Fees

If you charge an annual re-registration fee, the ELRC will pay this fee for your CCW enrolled children. This fee must be requested using the following form:

• Annual Registration Fee Form

Prior to authorizing these annual fees, the ELRC must receive a one-time verification of these charges. This may include a copy of your family handbook or family contract that states all families are charged an annual fee every year.

Please note that the ELRC will not pay any other type of fee such as waitlist fees, field trip fees, etc. If you have any questions, you can click <u>here</u> to read the full announcement or reach out to your Provider Specialist.

Work Force Support 2.0

Payments for the Work Force Support Grant 2.0 were sent out to providers on January 31, 2023. If you did not receive your payment or think there is an error, please reach out to elrc-ksgrants@cscinc.org.

All staff retention funds must be paid out to the staff within 45 days of receipt. These funds must be paid out in one lump amount and must be paid through payroll.

Staff recruitment funds may be used on expenses between 7/1/22-6/30/23. Please see your grant application for a list of eligible expenses.

Winter Weather

It is officially winter, but harsh weather conditions should not stop us from exploring and learning outside. Refer to the <u>Child Care Weather Watch</u> as a resource to determine the safe length of play. Active Outdoor Play is a good

resource from the California Childcare Program -University of California. Children ages 0-6 should engage in both indoor and outdoor play multiple times throughout their day.

Participation in outdoor activities in cold weather is possible and enjoyable when children/staff dress appropriately. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) offer the following recommendations.

Adults and children should wear:

- 1. Hat
- 2. Scarf
- 3. Sleeves that are snug at the wrist
- 4. Mittens

work best.

- 5. Water -resistant coat and boots
- 6. Several layers of loose-fitting clothing

Layer Up:

- Inner Layer: Wear fabrics that will hold more body heat and do not absorb moisture. Wool, silk polypropylene will hold more body heat than cotton.
- Insulation Layer: An insulation layer will help you retain heat by trapping air close to your body. Natural fibers, like wool, goose down, or a fleece

• Outer Layer: The outermost layer helps protect you from wind, rain, and snow. It should be tightly woven, and preferably water and wind resistant, to reduce loss of body heat.

COVID vaccines

Safe, effective, and free <u>COVID-19 vaccines</u> are now recommended for children ages 6 months and older.

Mandated Reporter Training in Spanish

<u>iLookOut's</u> interactive, online training is now available in Spanish for all mandated reporters in Pennsylvania. This evidence-based training meets Pennsylvania's requirements, can be completed over multiple sessions, and is free of charge.

iLookOut uses a story-based approach for preparing mandated reporters to identify and help protect children who may be experiencing abuse, and was

developed under the aegis of Penn State's Center for the Protection of Children. To access it in Spanish, toggle the language from English to Español once on the website.



A disability can affect a child's activities and ability to learn. Some children with disabilities need extra health services and support services. Children with disabilities are at higher risk for tooth decay and other oral health problems than children without disabilities.

- Children with physical disabilities, such as cerebral palsy, may not have the motor skills they need to use a toothbrush safely or to sit still in a dental chair during dental visits.
- Children with communication disorders, such as delayed speech and language development, may not be able to tell their parents that they have a toothache.
- Children who get frequent medical care, such as having many medical visits or hospital stays, may be afraid of the dental office and may not cooperate during visits.
- Children who take medicines with added sugars or that cause dry mouth are at high risk for tooth decay.

• Children on special diets may be at high risk for tooth decay. Foods that are soft or high in starch (e.g., potatoes, corn) stick to children's teeth and give bacteria in the mouth more time to cause tooth decay.

Strategies to Help Improve the Oral Health of Children with Disabilities

Click <u>here</u> to learn more about taking care of teeth, selecting the right toothbrush, adapting toothbrushes, addressing challenges, providing good nutrition, encouraging safety, and going to the dentist.

- **Give children with disabilities extra support**. Make sure children eat food and drink beverages low in sugar and that children's teeth are brushed with fluoridated toothpaste after meals. Children with intellectual disabilities may need extra time for brushing.
