Rapid Response Team

The Rapid Response Team provides prompt support in the event a child is at risk of suspension or expulsion. It is a short-term, collaborative approach, designed to connect families and providers with existing tools and resources. Supports are customized to fit a child's or teacher's needs.



Requests can be made using this <u>RRT Referral form</u>. Referrals are processed on a first come, first served basis and we ask that providers prioritize one child referral at a time. One of the goals of the RRT is that strategies and supports will be used across classrooms at the provider so that all children and staff will benefit from these supports.

Before submitting a referral, please discuss with the parent as parental consent is required. Child observations, screenings, and parent conferences should also have been completed so that you can provide the referral coordinator with detailed information regarding the case.

If you have any questions regarding the RRT supports, please reach out to your Quality Coach.

Rapid Response Team - Tip of the Month Transition Time

Transitions can be difficult for some children which can lead to challenging behaviors as they struggle to adapt to a change in their day. Children may become frustrated when forced to stop an activity in which they are engaged and enjoying. They may be experiencing anxiety as they have to leave their classroom to transition to another setting. Behaviors can quickly escalate leaving teachers wondering how to handle the situation.

Empowering teachers with some simple techniques, such as using visual cues prior to the transition time, can make days runs smoother for everyone.

Take a look at these transition strategies and consider adding this topic to an upcoming staff meeting agenda. Discuss the challenges your staff may be having around transition times and choose 2-3 strategies to try over the next two weeks. Pop into classrooms and see how things are going to show your support!




The Child Care Works provider agreement outlines expectations for suspension

and expulsion of children enrolled.

- Providers must have a written expulsion and suspension policy that is shared with parents and includes a protocol to apply when an at-risk child is identified.
- Provider must contact the ELRC prior to suspending or expelling a CCW child. Please contact your Provider Specialist to report your intentions prior to taking action.
- Note that our Quality Coaches are available for additional supports using the Rapid Response Team (see Rapid Response Team information above).

2025 OCDEL Conference

Registration is now open for the 2025 Pennsylvania Office of Child Development and Early Learning (OCDEL) Early Childhood Education Conference, *Stable and Secure: Supporting Children Through Trauma Sensitive Approaches*. This two-day conference is scheduled for April 22-23, 2025, at the Wyndham Grand Pittsburgh Downtown in Pittsburgh, PA and is free for attendees. In addition, up to two overnight rooms will also be paid for by OCDEL. This conference is open to all child care providers, but due to attendance limitations prioritized attendance will be for early childhood directors and teachers. Registration is limited to two staff per program.

Disinfection vs. Sanitation

In childcare settings, maintaining a safe and healthy environment for our children is of utmost importance. Two key processes that contribute to this goal are sanitation and disinfection. While these terms are often used interchangeably, they represent different practices that serve distinct purposes.



Sanitation refers to the process of reducing the number of germs, dirt, and impurities on surfaces to a safe level. This is typically achieved through cleaning practices that involve soap, water, and physical removal of debris.

Disinfection, on the other hand, involves using chemical agents to kill or inactivate germs on surfaces. This process is vital in preventing the spread of illnesses, particularly in settings where children are in close contact with one another. Disinfection is often applied after sanitation, as its most effective on surfaces that are already clean.

- 1. Establish a Routine: Create a regular schedule for cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched surfaces such as toys, tables, and doorknobs. Daily routines help ensure that these areas remain clean.
- 2. Use the Right Products: Choose EPA-approved disinfectants that are effective against a broad range of pathogens. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions for use, including contact time and dilution ratios. Avoid using these products with children present and always keeps these products locked away out of reach of the children.
- 3. Educate Staff: Provide training for staff on the differences between sanitation and disinfection, as well as best practices for both.
- 4. Involve Children: Teach children about the importance of cleanliness through fun activities, such as handwashing songs or cleaning games. Engaging them in

the process fosters a sense of responsibility and awareness.



Setting Oral Health Goals

Why is setting goals important? Goal setting can help you create new behaviors. It can also allow you to measure your progress. Finally, it can give you the motivation to maintain healthy oral health habits.

- Healthy oral health habits include:
- Regular dental visits and treatment
- Healthy snacks
- Brush with fluoride toothpaste at least twice a day
- No sugary beverages
- No bottle for bed
- Water or milk only in sippy cups
- Drink tap water
- Avoid or limit junk food and candy
- Limit sugar and consider sugar substitutes
